From the Executive Director Changes in Minnesota Electrical License Exams

As we all know, the MN licensing exam is one of the toughest. It is harder than most other states electrical exams as well as other licensed trades. The MN Department of Labor's statistics prove this. The pass rate for the Journeyworker electrical exam

averages at 32% over the past 5 years (40% for the master exam). Compare this to plumbing with an average Journeyworker pass rate of 77% (79% for the master exam) or elevator at 65% (100% for the master exam) over the past 5 years. The MNDLI works hard with the industry to make these tests fair and a true test of the knowledge an individual possesses. As a MN resident, it makes me confident that those who hold a Journeyworker and/or Master Electrician license are extremely qualified.

As you all know, with the large amounts of work and construction projects, an increase in Journeyworkers to supervise apprentices is also needed. The Board of Electricity has been listening and evaluating the exam to determine if there is anything they can do to help. One of the biggest issues that test takers have is the amount of time given to answer the 100 questions. They may not have a lack of knowledge in some of these scenarios, just a lack of time to fully understand the entire question and answer correctly.

In hopes to assist these test takers, the electrical exam for **Journeyworker** electricians has changed from 100 questions to 80 questions. This change went into effect early January 2019. The degree of difficulty is between 1.5 to 2.5, with 1 being the easiest and 5 being the hardest to answer.

The **Master** electrician exam is currently undergoing change as well, so it too will be reworked to 80 questions and is expected to go into effect in April of 2019. The degree of difficulty for the questions are between 2.5 – 3.5. The test for **Maintenance** electrician's licenses have 70 questions.

All license examinations are a maximum of 5.5 hours and a passing score for all exams is 70% correct.

The test is still considered a comprehensive test that incorporates all aspects of the current National Electrical Code (NEC). The test is designed to assess the electrician's competence in utilizing the code. The State wants to be sure the licensed electrician can practice within the scope of their license without harm to the public.

The current question format has been in effect since 2017. Multiple-choice answers will have only one correct answer. There are some questions in the negative response category such as: "Which of the following does NOT apply". See sample questions in the DLI website.

The first Journeyworker exam at 80 questions had 12 takers and 7 passed the exam (58%). We will see what type of new statistics this format unveils. MEA's Director of Education (Jeff Keljik) works closely with the MN Department of Labor and Board of Electricity to ensure best practices for the industry. If any of your electricians have feedback on the exam, please let Jeff know. We compile all of this information and relay it appropriately.

The creators of the Minnesota exam have reviewed the curriculum in the MEA Exam Prep Workbook and agreed that if a student can complete this workbook, they should be able to pass the exam. Our class will get you up to speed in areas of the code you may not work with on a daily basis. See MEA's website for all current offering options.

COMPLIANCE

Master electrician licenses expire Feb 28... Renew online at https://secure.doli.state.mn.us/license/Default. aspx. The fee is \$73 (reduced from \$88 in 2016 and \$118.40 in 2014). Renewing without completing continuing education may result in license suspension and a fine of \$1000. Of the required 16 hrs, at least 12 must pertain to the NEC. No more than 4 hrs may pertain to technical topics related to electrical installations and equipment, or the MN statutes governing electrical work. CONSTRUCTION TRENDS

Construction Input Prices Continue to Fall in December... Construction input prices declined 1.7% in December on a month-over-month basis yet are 3.5% higher than the same time last year, according to an Associated Builders and Contractors analysis of US BLS data released today. In December, nonresidential construction prices fell 1.6% but are up 4.1% compared to one year ago. Among 11 subcategories monitored in the data, 6 declined in price last month, with the crude petroleum category registering the largest decrease at 3.7% and 11.1% year-over-year. The decline in input prices occurred despite a massive run-up in natural gas prices of 64.3%. (www.abc.org)

ENERGY

Minnesota could economically reach 70% renewable electricity... The MN Dept of Commerce, clean energy advocates, and all the state's major utilities over the past three years developed the Solar Potential Analysis Report (published in November) concludes that MN could get 70% of its electricity from wind and solar by 2050 at no additional cost compared to natural gas. Instead of batteries to balance the variable generation, it suggests that overbuilding wind and solar capacity would be more economical. The model calls for reaching up to 22 gigawatts capacity each for wind and solar power. (www.mncee.org)

LABOR & MANAGEMENT

(US) 5 Million New Jobs... The U.S. economy exceeded expectations with 312,000 jobs added in Dec and an additional 58,000 in upward revisions from Oct and Nov – bringing the total to 5 million jobs added since the 2016 election. Significant job gains were widespread, including in construction, manufacturing, retail trade, education and health services, leisure/hospitality sectors. (www.dol.gov)

(US) Unemployment... Rose to 3.9% on a seasonally adjusted basis in December. (www.deed.mn.gov)

(MN) Unemployment... unemployment rate held steady for the fourth consecutive month at 2.8% in December on a seasonally adjusted basis. The state added 500 jobs in Dec 2018, helping it keep its seasonally adjusted unemployment rate below the national level of 3.9% for the month. MN's all time low is 2.5%, recorded in Jan and Feb of 1999. For the year, MN added 31,441 jobs, a 1.1% increase, according to the state DEED report. That is below the 1.8% growth seen nationally. (www.twincities.com)

NORTH DAKOTA

Power Limited Licensing... North Dakota Board supports legislative bill for power limited technician licensing and is looking for interested parties to come & testify. If you are a company presently doing power limited work, you really need to come out and testify. Because of the increased creation of various power limited systems for homes and businesses, the board has been contemplating a power limited technician license or another class of electricians. The board feels this is a necessary license, similar to the electrical license, to ensure individuals have the understanding and are trained in installing power limited systems and are educated in the requirements of the NEC and the ND Wiring Standards articles that are associated with power limited work. We will be posting the legislative committee meeting dates (www.ndseb.com), so if you are interested you would have an opportunity to testify.
